The Great Lakes — Superior, Michigan, Huron, Erie, and Ontario — form the largest group of freshwater lakes on Earth. Together, they hold about 21% of the world's surface fresh water. More than 30 million people in Canada and the United States rely on the Great Lakes for drinking water, transportation, and recreation. However, the lakes face serious challenges. Pollution from factories, agricultural runoff, and invasive species like zebra mussels threaten the ecosystem. Scientists and governments on both sides of the border are working together to protect this vital resource for future generations.

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Passage 2: The Invention of Insulin

Read the passage, then answer the questions.

In 1921, Canadian scientist Frederick Banting and his assistant Charles Best made one of the most important medical discoveries in history. Working at the University of Toronto, they discovered that a substance from the pancreas — which they called insulin — could lower blood sugar levels. At the time, diabetes was a fatal disease. Their first human patient, 14-year-old Leonard Thompson, was near death when he received insulin injections in January 1922. His condition improved dramatically. Banting and his colleague J.J.R. Macleod won the Nobel Prize in 1923. Rather than patenting insulin for profit, Banting sold the patent to the University of Toronto for just one dollar, believing that a life-saving medicine should be available to everyone.
